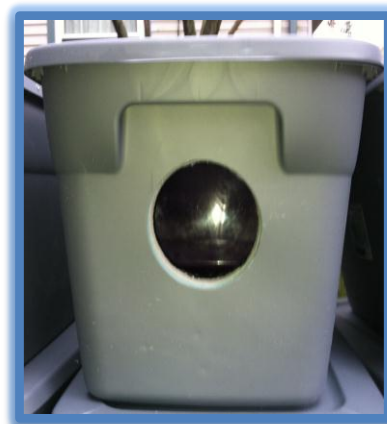




CASH, BUCKS, DOUGH ...

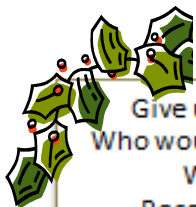

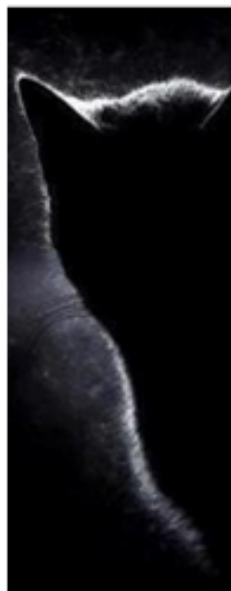
Give us a chance who are not brand new

Ask The Local Vet

"What are the signs of frost bite and how is it treated?"

Shivering, ice, and tissues that go from bright red, to gray, and to black are all indicators of frostbite. It can affect other parts of the body but tips of ears, toes and tails are the most susceptible.

You should seek veterinary care as soon as possible if you suspect your pet is suffering from frostbite. There are some things you can do in the interim to make your animal more comfortable until you can reach the vet.

Warm the affected area either by using warmed ice packs or towels moistened with warm water. You can also soak an affected limb in warm water, but do not put the animal completely in water, as this increases the risk of hypothermia. Pat your pet dry, but do not massage or rub the frostbitten area. Any of these methods may cause discomfort as feeling returns to the area. Wrap your pet in a blanket for their protection for the trip to the vet.

Recipe

DOUBLE CHEDDAR CHEESE COOKIES
1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
2 cups shredded mild cheddar cheese
1/2 cup butter
2/3 cup milk
2 cups whole wheat flour
Directions: Preheat oven to 300°F
Combine all ingredients. Roll dough to desired thickness and cut into shapes with the fox cutter or one of your choice. Place cookies on greased cookie sheet and bake for 20-25 minutes until the edges brown and the cheese is bubbly. Cool and refrigerate.

HOLIDAY FOODS THAT ARE DANGEROUS

Be wary of dropping any yeast dough or batter while making holiday goodies, the dough may expand and harm your pet if ingested.

Fruitcake, or anything containing grapes or raisins, should be kept out of your animal's reach. It is unknown why pets become so ill from these foods, but from personal experience, they should be avoided.

Candies left in dishes for guests to enjoy should be inaccessible to your pets. Not only are the wrappers a choking hazard, but they may contain xylitol (a sweetener) which is toxic to pets or animals.

While humans may enjoy a libation or two at the holidays, in no situation is it appropriate to share with your pet. Just as humans can suffer alcohol poisoning, so, too, can animals.

Although not necessarily ingredients of holiday treats, it is important to note that onions are one of the most toxic human foods to pets. Care should be taken when preparing holiday dishes containing onion and garlic. Garbage should be secured to keep your animals safe.

The holidays can be merry for every member of your household if you keep special holiday goodies to yourself and treat your pets to animal appropriate snacks. *Happy Holidays!*

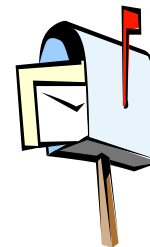
